Martina: I never had an education in photography, I started to photograph when I was sixteen years old and after a little time I won a local contest in which the theme was 'women's emancipation'. The judges said to me that they where impressed by the way I expressed the concept in my photos. Most of my photos are conceptual and a lot of my pictures are self-portraits. When I photograph, I don't like to have lot of people around me, because I feel it as an intimate moment in which I express my 'art'. I hope to become a photographer in the future, but if it won't happen, I will continue to photograph because it's what I love most in the world.

Everything which provokes a strong feeling in me is an inspiration. It can be a song, a movie, a word or a look. I also get inspired from poetry (I love English 19th century poets) or from art, particularly from the surreal artists of the first half of 20th century.

My favorite photographer and biggest example is Man Ray. I think he was a genius and he had amazing intuitions in discovering human beings nature. Besides I adore Elliott Erwitt, Annie Leibovitz and Anton Corbijn.

THE SLEEPING BEAUTY (RIGHT)

Martina: This photo is (together with 'Cinderella') part of the project 'Princesses'. The problem of this photo was that the model had her eyes open, so I decided to cut the image a little in the upper part so as it seems that she is sleeping. To remind the idea of a princess which is in the wood I put some fallen leafs on her. Then I put a blue filter to make the colors warmer.

CINDERELLA (TOP)

Martina: This photo is a part of the project 'Princesses'. I wanted to create a new surreal version of the most famous princesses of the fairytale tradition. For its creation, I used a smoke bomb. There was too little smoke around on the first image that I took, so in the editing I superimposed another image with more smoke on the lower side. I suggest doing always more photos with the camera in the same position, so in post-production it will be easier to correct!

ALISSO (BOTTOM)

Martina: Alisso is the name of a flower which means 'Value beyond beauty'. This is a self-portrait and I gave this meaning to the picture after taking it because the position of my hair reminded me the figure of a 'shy' flower. I took this photo on my sofa which is very old and used but it always fascinated me because of its lived-in appearance. I chose this photo because it was one of my first shots chosen by PhotoVogue Italy's website.







EVA'S DREAM (LEFT)

Martina: This is an instant photo. I used the double exposure setting on the camera and I got this almost abstract picture. The great thing about instant photos is that you never know surely what you will obtain and sometimes it surprises you. I'm getting more and more interested in analog and instant photography, because I love the suspense while waiting to see the images.

EVANESCENCE (RIGHT)

Martina: You won't believe it, but this photo isn't retouched! It is my reflection on the shower glass. I was near the window, so in the brightest side my figure is more defined than in the darker one. In the post-production I just added a blue filter to make it more interesting. I had no idea that this would be the result until I saw it on the camera screen! You always have to try everything, also the strangest things!



This photo tells the story of the girl that goes back to her childhood home and reminds her childhood, but with the conscience of an adult.

Initially - inspired by Devinsupertramp - wanted to shoot videos rather than photos. But soon figured out, how incredibly much more time it took to produce a decent video. So in the meantime, Kai started taking photos which he enjoyed very much as well.

Kai: After a year I started taking photos of people because of the original intentions - meeting awesome people and create beautiful work together. I've spent nearly every free second learning about photography, reading blogs, practice Photoshop and - of course - shoot. That way I gathered quite some knowledge in a small amount of time. Photography sure turned my life to the better! I've met awesome new people, found my passion and even met my new girlfriend, who happens to be a model and photographer as well. You might find her in a lot of my photos.

My favourite fields are portrait photography and conceptional people photography. Both genres can transport such great emotions. 


BRONZE (TOP)

BALLOON GIRL (RIGHT)



DREAMIN (RIGHT)



28-years-old based in Bucharest, Romania and has graduated with a degree in Cognitive Psychology and Neurobiology. Started taking photos 3 years ago and her first subject was food. Although she liked food photography very much, she discovered portrait photography a year ago and it was like a revelation.

Monica: Lately, I've been working on a self-portrait project. As I see it now, it may be a long project. Self-portraits are, for me, the best way to express my vision, my emotions and the entire world that I have in my head. I'm an introvert, so this is for me a way to speak with people. Self-portraits are also such a challenge. I had to learn to express my emotions using my body and my face. This is definitely not easy for a totally inexpressive person. I'm still learning these things. It's a part of the ritual before every series I take to learn the poses that will help me create the images that I have in my mind. Another important part of the shooting process is finding the dresses. The dress usually outlines the mood of a series. After finding the dress, I look for a place to shoot. I shoot outside only, landscapes being an important part of my portraits. I don't work with a team, I prepare everything by myself, starting with the hair and makeup and finishing with the actual shooting. I have an assistant that helps me with the focusing and capturing part, as I do not use a remote control. It would limit my posing a lot. Post-processing is an important part of creating my images. I always say that I could not do photography if post-processing would not be an option. I post-process my photos using Photoshop and this is the part where a series outlines its mood and story.

I get my inspiration from those dresses that have an old, vintage look and that I use in my series. I'm also inspired by other photographer's amazing work. I love the work of Maja Topčagić. The way she started her career inspired me a lot. I also love Kirsty Mitchell. The amount of work that she put before every shooting is incredibly inspiring. There a many other photographers that I like, it would be a long list to enumerate them all here.



I worked on many different conditions and lights, and because I had to use very often cheap equipment and improvise, I'm prepared for everything. I still struggle, like probably most of creatives, with getting models or finding a paid job. But I'm proud of the fact that I stayed strong and I keep doing what I love. I live away from my comfort zone – I'm Polish, but I live in the UK. Being an immigrant is very challenging, tough experience and probably much harder than living in your own environment. I can even fulfil my dreams sometimes, like attending to Emily Soto's workshop in Paris. What inspires me? Everything. I never plan my shooting, mostly I improvise, and many times it gives me better effects. I love to look at models and wait for the perfect moment, when they transform in front of the camera. For me the big part of being a photographer is watching, so I keep watching: other (amazing) photographer's works, designers, websites and even webshops. I also love cinema, music, literature and culture is a big part of what gives me strength and inspiration. I am still learning and I feel like I can do much, much better. Personally, I think that in photography it is very important not only to make a good picture technically, but also to have some good taste aesthetically. I care a lot about colours and the quality of my work. I'm in this place now, where there is no space for coincidence. And I want to be better. I admire a lot of photographers like Emily Soto and Joanna Kustra. I look at many amazing works every day and I feel both: small and honoured that I can call myself a photographer too.



WHAT IS YOUR PERSONAL CONNECTION WITH CONCEPTUAL PHOTOGRAPHY?

Arimbi: I love creating photos that are surreal. That's why I love to create conceptual photos, because it allows me to express my creativity to the fullest without any limits and boundaries.

TELL US SOME BACKGROUND INFO OF THE WINNING SHOT

Arimbi: The winning shot was taken in 2013, during a trip to Puncak with my friends. It was really foggy at the time and I thought it was perfect for a photohoot. So I asked my friend Gave to model for me. Around 10 minutes later by the time he was ready for the shoot the fog has faded unfortunately, but we kept shooting anyway. So we eventually didn't get the foggy shot but then during post-production I worked something out and in the end this was the final product. And actually, the winning shot is a re-edit of a shot that I made 2 years ago.

WHAT IS YOUR MOST FAVOURITE CONCEPTUAL SHOT?

Arimbi: My personal favorite shot is *The Daydreaming Fairy* from my *Red Riding Hood* series. Even though it's not my first conceptual picture and obviously not my best work, but that is the first conceptual picture that I'm really proud of. I remember looking at Brooke Shaden's work and I was completely in awe and really inspired by her works. This picture (and this series) was totally influenced by her artistry and this series remains one of my favorites .

WHAT GEAR DO YOU USE?

Arimbi: Currently I'm using a Canon EOS 60D , with Canon 50mm f1.8 lens, a Canon 18-135mm lens and a 75-300mm lens. But my early conceptual works were mostly taken with my Canon EOS 1100D .

ANY CONCEPTUAL PHOTOGRAPHY RELATED ADVICE? Arimbi: Well my advice is: Keep experimenting, keep exploring and keep practicing. Because practice makes perfect.
